SOUTH CAROLINA SUSTAINABLE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES SUMMIT: HELPING JOHNNIE WALK TO SCHOOL, TU-PC1 AND WE-PC2

This year AIA-South Carolina, the SC Arts Foundation, SC Chapter of the Council of Education Facility Planners International, the SC Arts Commission, and the Riley Institute at Furman University have partnered to bring together a diverse array of stakeholders to study and affect policy changes that make renovation and construction of community-centered schools more feasible. This two-day Summit is part of a larger initiative supported by the National Trust for Historic Preservation and the Environmental Protection Agency's Helping Johnnie Walk to School Initiative. South Carolina was selected as one of six states to participate in this initiative that explores ways in which schools may be sited to not only achieve educational objectives, but also anchor the local neighborhood, support better public health, create a cleaner environment, and offer amenities to the community.

The first day of the Summit, Tuesday, September 29th, is geared for the educational community, governmental agencies, and interested community groups. The day will include a keynote address by Dr. David Salvesen, University of North Carolina's Center for Urban and Regional Studies and sessions which discuss how sites are selected, safe transportation for students, and cooperative planning for our school facilities. The second day, Wednesday, September 30th, is one of the AIA pre-conference sessions for design professionals featuring a keynote address by Dr. Jim Rex, State Superintendent of Education for South Carolina. WE PC2 DESIGNING AND MAINTAINING OUTSTANDING SCHOOL FACILITIES: SC SUSTAINABLE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES SUMMIT, 8:00-5:00pm VARIOUS SPEAKERS

As important community centers, the maintenance and design of school facilities are integral to the education of South Carolina's children and the future of our communities. Join us for a series of sessions focusing on the architect's role in creating community schools. Sessions include a keynote address by Dr. Jim Rex, State Superintendent of Education for South Carolina, William Carpenter, FAIA of Founder of Lightroom and a panel discussion on alternate delivery methods, Sean O'Donnell, Principal of Ehrenkrantz, Eckstut & Kuhn Architects on approaches to rehabilitating historic schools, Royce Yeater, AIA, Midwest Director of the National Trust for Historic Preservation on the Helping Johnnie Walk to School Initiative and Allen Taylor, LS3P Associates with the Sustainable Schools Committee of the SC Chapter of USGBC on green strategies for schools.

WE PC3 CRACKING THE CODES: BUILDING CODE FUNDAMENTALS AND A SYSTEMATIC PROCEDURE FOR PERFORMING SUCCESSFUL BUILDING CODE REVIEWS, 8:00-5:00pm MICHAEL HALLASY, AIA, NCARB, LEED AP

On many projects the building code can be as important as the Owner's program in shaping the building, yet many architects find themselves dreading and cursing it. To them, the building code is "the enemy." Just think how much more fun they would have if the building code was their "friend". This seminar will show you how to calmly and effectively navigate through the building code and how to better understand its requirements. We will review, discuss and demonstrate important building code terms, concepts and calculations including Occupancy Classifications, Mixed Occupancy, Occupancy Separation, Construction Types, Fire-Rated Assemblies, Automatic Fire Suppression, Allowable Heights and Areas Calculations, Means of Egress and Site Considerations. We will also discuss and examine common pitfalls and sources of confusion and frustration. As we discuss these topics, we will learn a systematic method for performing building code reviews that helps to save time, increase accuracy and reduce confusion and frustration.

The face of the hottest green building program in the country is changing. A new program, called, LEED 2009, has been launched this year by the US Green Building Council; new requirements for becoming a LEED Accredited Professional have been established as well. Join us for a full-day technical overview of this new LEED program which includes structural changes of the points system and new requirements for those who are interested in becoming a LEED Accredited Professional. The bulk of the day will be spent on reviewing the technical content of the LEED 2009 program that focuses on Sustainable Sites, Energy Conservation, Reducing Potable Water Demand, Choosing Materials & Resources wisely, and Improving the Indoor Environment of Buildings. The day concludes with an overview of the new Green Building Certification Institute LEED Accredited Professional credentialing requirements.
